Proposed 2025 MX multi-generational class (Pedagogy – the study of learning)

This weekend it was mentioned that McKnight is considering a multi-generational class sometime in 2025. I am hoping this is still under consideration as the prospect of such a class gives me pause. As I consider the class I can think of two possible goals – education and socialization – and it would be good to understand what we are trying to accomplish with such a class as I do not think it will help with either.

Education: If we are trying to improve education, there does not seem to be any way such a mixture of ages will be beneficial. It will certainly be less beneficial than what we are doing now. In any situation where we try to educate, we divide the students by age (or ability). Countries spend billions of dollars trying to educate their citizens and have yet to decide to mix ages in a classroom. We work hard at McKnight to provide age-appropriate classes for our children and adults. In fact, I would say that all civilizations from the dawn of humanity have done what they could to separate adolescent boys from the rest of society. (OK, perhaps I am being hyperbolic).

Socialization: If the goal is to find a way to mix ages to allow familiarity, I also question that a class is the best solution. I would first ask if there were a need for more mixed-age socialization. If so, would there not be better solutions that having a mixed-age class? Eating together always seems to be a better way of mixing it up and getting to know people.

It may seem that I am a wet blanket, but I want to make sure that we are working to move the ball forward. That we carefully consider how we want to spend our time and that we work towards specific aims.
